In 2013, a volunteer for one of our Elderly Fall Prevention Roadshows invited Grandma Lo to do a fall risk assessment. After Grandma Lo was identified as being a high risk case, we provided some follow-up services, including installing handrails in her home and teaching her some rehabilitation exercises.

Grandma Lo improved so much that she later could walk around her neighbourhood even without the aid of a walking stick.

Here is what she said when we interviewed her: "HOPE worldwide really gave me hope!"

ELDERLY

Helping the elderly age healthily and with dignity

Volunteers are integral to our Elderly Programme. Without the volunteers, elderly like Grandma Lo in the cover story could not have been reached. So whether you volunteered once or multiple times in our Fall Prevention and Fulfill a Wish Programmes or through the annual Volunteers for Seniors Day, thank you for bringing hope to the elderly by keeping them physically and emotionally healthy.

Here is what you accomplished in 2013:

3,033 volunteer instances throughout the year.

1,827 elderly screened for fall risks in 16 roadshows. Elderly identified as high risk cases were provided with walking aids or had handrails installed at home or received home visits by occupational therapists.

822 elderly visited on Volunteers for Seniors Day in January. 95% of the elderly visited felt happy and grateful for the service.

124 wishes were fulfilled. These wishes included outings to Ocean Park and Disneyland, having reading glasses fitted, and singing and watching Cantonese opera.



We received over 2,000 entries for our second Lucky Bag Drawing Competition. Dreamergo, a local artist, helped us choose the overall winner.

YOUTH

Giving Hong Kong's youth financial knowledge and career-related guidance programmes

In 2013 the Citi Success Fund gave 89 mini-grants to secondary school teachers and social workers to implement proposals that helped Hong Kong's youth find their passions, aptitudes, and potential career paths. Thanks to a matching grant from the Partnership Fund for the Disadvantaged, we were able to serve students in 24 other schools. Altogether 7,771 secondary school students benefitted from the programmes and activities.



The Citi Success Fund Programme gave these young people the experience of running their own business.

The career-related guidance programmes helped the students find and develop their aptitudes, trained their interviewing skills, and brought in working professionals from different fields to share about possible career paths. Programmes aimed at increasing the students' financial knowledge gave them the opportunity to learn how to develop a budget and business plan for a small business idea.

The Citi Success Fund Programme helped thousands of secondary students find possible future career paths.

CHILDREN (HONG KONG)

Giving children from low-income families the opportunity to reach their potential

In July of 2013 you fulfilled a dream for us. Your consistent support over the years allowed us to open an outreach centre in Yuen Long to serve needy children in the Tin Shui Wai area. Through our year-round academic enhancement and character-building programmes, the centres in Shek

Kip Mei and Tin Shui Wai served 389 members and 802 additional children in the community. The frequency of participation in all the programmes and events reached a high of 9,905.


Children come to the Centre for Kids to learn, to play, to build character, and to form a supportive community around each other.



In our children's programme focused on giving skills to help the kids reach their potential. Academically, the children learned build six different skills, such as cognitive (focused when doing homework), behavioural (hands in homework on

time), and time management (arranges time for revisions before exams) skills. On character-building, the children learned to develop positive behaviours related to the Six Pillars of Character, such as saying hello when meeting new friends, returning objects to where they belong, and showing respect to others.





CHILDREN (CHINA)

Helping rural and urban poor break the cycle of poverty by giving their children the gift of education

In 2013 your generosity sent 1,615 students in rural and urban areas in China's Hunan, Gansu, Guangdong, and Sichuan provinces to school. Regardless of whether these students had just started first grade or were preparing for the grueling gaokao (university entrance exam), each one of them represented hope for their families. Thank you for the gift of education that gave them hope.

worldwide Centre for Kids in Chengdu, Guangzhou, and Kunming. These centres served 1,000 migrant workers' children in 2013. Much like the Centre for Kids in Hong

Kong, the academic enhancement and character-building programmes provided the skills for the children to reach their potential and one day break the cycle of poverty.

Financials

Thanks to both existing and new donors, our financial picture in 2013 was a healthy one. When compared to 2012, our expenses rose by HK\$148,322, which was slightly more than 1%, while income rose by HK\$512,500, or nearly 4%. This resulted in a surplus that was nearly four times the surplus amount in 2012.

The increase in income came from the category of government and corporate grants. In 2013, in addition to existing corporate grants and donations, our Elderly Programme received new funds from two private foundations and one major corporation. Because of these donations, over 1,000 additional elderly received services such as fall risk assessments, fall prevention education, follow-up services by occupational therapists and having their wishes fulfilled. We are grateful and encouraged by the generosity of these donors. Because of them, more elderly in Hong Kong are ageing more healthily and with dignity. Thank you.

Our Centres for Kids in Chengdu also received needed funds to continue their services for migrant children in that city. In two instances the donation amounts were large enough to cover the cost of running the centre for an entire year. Again, we are more than grateful for the kindness and generosity of these donors.




