### The Ideal World

What would you like your kids to be doing when they get home from school?

Ideally, you or someone you trust is there to greet them. They have a small snack, work on their homework. Then have some play time (hopefully with another person, not a machine). Perhaps spend some time reading a good book. Have dinner with the family, finish up their homework and then off to bed.

For many poor families in Hong Kong, the reality is far from ideal.

### The Reality

Take for example, 9-year-old Ming. Ming leaves at 7 AM for her 20-minute walk to school every morning.

Ming's mother is a newcomer from the mainland. She works 12 hours a day at a seafood store in Mong Kok. She has no time to take Ming to school or pick her up at the end of the school day.

So what does Ming do? The primary three student comes home to an empty apartment after school. She's home alone until her mother gets off work at around 8 or 9 o'clock. Sometimes she watches TV for too long and does not start her homework until late. Sometimes she's more disciplined.

Ming's mother feels helpless. She does not make enough money to hire a helper or pay for half-day child care services. According to the Hong Kong Council of Social Service, the number of people living below the poverty line has increased to 1.26 million by October 2010, about 18% of the population.

When you are poor like Ming's family, you just have to live in a world far from ideal.

### **The Silver Lining**

But there is encouraging news! Your support of the HOPE *worldwide* Centre for Kids in Shek Kip Mei helps make the world of hundreds of kids like Ming a little closer to ideal. The Centre is a safe place for the kids to come to after school and especially during their long summer holidays. ## A Safe Place

Come to the HOPE *worldwide* Centre for Kids any weekday afternoon between 3 and 4 pm and you will feel a distinct change in the atmosphere.

Before 3 o'clock, the place is quiet, interspersed by voices coming from meetings. One quarter of the centre is office space where our staff of 17 quietly fulfills their respective responsibilities. Then at 3:30 pm the office doors are gently shut, the door bell starts to ring incessantly, and an inescapable buzz of children takes over the place.

#### Welcome to the HOPE worldwide Centre for Kids in Shek Kip Mei!

The centre is located in one of the districts with the greatest concentration of low-income families. Every weekday afternoon, 20-30 primary school kids come to the centre to get help on their homework from staff and volunteers. Parents in these families maybe too busy, or simply cannot help their children with the demands of school work. And all of them do not have the means to hire tutors. Having a place like the centre for their children to get help is a great relief to the parents. At the centre, not only do the children have staff and volunteers to give them a hand, they have each other. Some review and study together...and even get full marks together!

#### Beyond the Boundaries of Shek Kip Mei

Children from these families seldom venture outside of their immediate neighbourhoods. The cost of transportation, even public transportation, is a burden. Some have even never been on Hong Kong Island!

On weekends and especially during the long summer holidays, the centre provides outings to different parts of Hong Kong to broaden these children's horizons. Thanks to you, our supporters, we can provide these outings either free or at a nominal charge. The excursions are both educational and fun. For example, on an outing to Stanley Market, the children needed to find foreigners to carry out a simple interview so they could practice their oral English skills. By the end of the activity, the children were much more confident and fluent speaking English.

After participating in the centre's Character Success Programme, there was a clear change in Ka-lok's behavior. After his music lessons, he started to put away his instrument without being told. What's the big deal about picking up after yourself? It's a matter of character - responsibility, to be exact. In 2008, we began the Character Success Programme, based on the curriculum of "Character Counts!", the largest character education programme in the US. The children learn the six pillars of charactertrustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring, and citizenship, through activities and interactive games. With so much focus on the Hong Kong Prince/Princess Syndrome, it has been encouraging to see some of these children transform before our eyes.

#### See all the Good that You are Doing

Thank you for all the support you have given to HOPE worldwide and the Centre for Kids. Everything you do, whether it's volunteering or donating, helps change the lives of families and children like Ming. Because of you, one more mother does not have to feel helpless.
